The Masks We Wear, The Roles We Play

Did you ever wonder why on most Sunday mornings, right after the Call to Worship and Opening Hymn, we engage in a Prayer of Confession? The reason is not to punish us by making us recite our sins and failures out loud. We do so because the church has historically understood that in order to prepare one's self to worship God it is necessary to get rid of whatever spiritual baggage we have accumulated since we last worshiped. We make ourselves ready to hear God's word read and interpreted and we are better equipped to respond to the word when we have acknowledged that we—though imperfect people—receive God's grace and forgiveness and continually have an opportunity to reboot, to start over, to live anew in the love of God and our neighbors.

The church does something similar every year when we observe the forty day period called Lent. The season of Lent is intended to be one of self-reflection and honesty about who we are, and what we are not, as followers of Christ. Thus it is a kind of extended season of confession and repentance that make us ready to receive the ultimate Good News of Easter.

We mark the beginning of Lent by gathering for Holy Communion and to be marked with ashes as a sign of our recognition that we have fallen short of the glory of God. Each year on Ash Wednesday the scripture that is read includes this verse:


“And whenever you pray, do not be like the hypocrites; for they love to stand and pray in the synagogues and at the street corners, so that they may be seen by others. Truly I tell you, they have received their reward.”

MATTHEW 6:5

The word hypocrite is rooted in the Greek word hypokrites, which means “stage actor,” or “pretender.” Greek theatre had made its way into Israel when Alexander the Great invaded the region in about 330 BCE so the people Jesus was speaking to knew that Greek actors, known as “hypocrites,” wore masks as a part of their performances. So when Jesus called the Pharisees “hypocrites” he was revealing that behind the masks of righteousness they wore, they were not the blameless and upright exemplars they were pretending to be. Rather, they were just as flawed as anyone else and in just as much need of God's grace and mercy.

Likewise, Jesus used parables—simple, but layered stories that contained religious and moral truth—in order to challenge his listeners to examine the roles they played in the stories and their own motives.

This season, our Lenten worship series is entitled: “The Parables of Jesus: the Masks We Wear and the Roles We Play.” It is our prayer that these stories will speak to us anew and guide us to be more self-reflective and to recognize that we are all in need of God’s grace. I hope to see you in worship this week!

Cookies for Kairos – A Lenten Spiritual Discipline

Kairos Prison Ministry is a Christian faith-based ministry that addresses the spiritual needs of incarcerated men, women, youth, their families and those who work with them. Kairos prison ministries helps guests find God's grace and forgiveness in their lives at God's special time or "Kairos".

Each April and October, we help support a team that spends three days sharing their faith at Stateville Prison. Our ministry consists primarily of baking cookies! This Lent, we ask again that you and your family help bake some of the two thousand dozen cookies that teams bring to Kairos weekend events to demonstrate God's endless love and grace.

Booklets containing the approved recipes will be available at the church and online beginning on Ash Wednesday, February 26. Please be sure to use only approved recipes found in the Kairos booklet and please take a moment while you are mixing or baking or packing up your cookies to pray over them. To pray that the prisoners, guards, lay people and others who will receive your cookies do find God's grace and forgiveness and come to understand "Kairos."

This is a powerful ministry and it needs our powerful support – please return your cookies to the freezer in the big kitchen or the kitchen at First UMC on or before Palm Sunday, April 5. The office staff can help between 9:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. weekdays.

OPPORTUNITIES TO SERVE OUR NEIGHBOR

UMCOR Sunday, March 22

A special offering is taken in all United Methodist churches each year on the fourth Sunday of Lent. Funds raised through this offering are used to support the infrastructure of the United Methodist Committee on Relief and keep the promise that whenever a designated gift is given, 100% of those dollars are used for the relief the donor designates. Any extra funds raised on UMCOR Sunday go to relief wherever they are most needed.

Founded in 1940, UMCOR is the global humanitarian aid organization of the United Methodist Church. It works in more than 80 countries worldwide, including the United States. Its mission is to alleviate human suffering—whether caused by war, conflict, or natural disaster—with open hearts and minds to all people.

UMCOR responds to natural or civil disasters that are interruptions of such magnitude that they overwhelm a community's ability to recover on its own. UMCOR works through programs that address hunger, poverty, sustainable agriculture, international and domestic emergencies, refugee and immigrant concerns, global health issues, and transitional development.

UMCOR projects are often joined with Growing Hope Globally and Heifer International efforts (two other groups that Barrington UMC faithfully supports). The predominance of Methodist hospitals across Africa prompted The Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation to partner with The United Methodist Church worldwide for Imagine No Malaria, an effort that has reduced deaths from malaria by 60%.

Disaster relief or special project offerings can be designated at any time. Additional offerings are suggested to the congregation following natural disasters or when events warrant.

Short Stories by Jesus: The Enigmatic Parables of a Controversial Rabbi

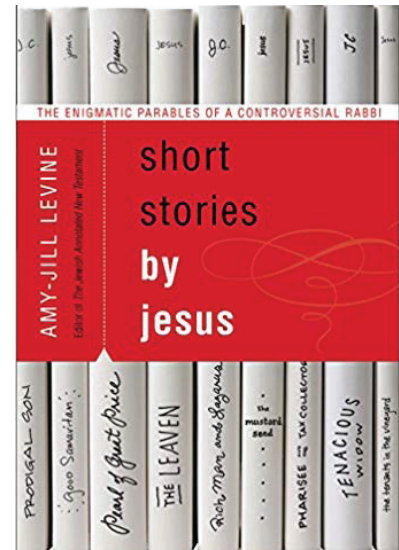

UMM Annual Meeting

Jim Stein, Jim Finn, Bill West, and John Maxson represented our church at the Northern Illinois Conference United Methodist Men's Annual Meeting on Saturday, February 22, 2020, at Wesley United Methodist Church on Chicago's south side.

Bishop Sally Dyck (pictured below) conducted a communion service and preached a sermon titled "I Can See Clearly Now." During her presentation she summarized some of the financial and operational realities the United Methodist Church is facing due to an uncertain future. For example, to reduce expenses the Conference has already reduced staff and streamlined operations. The Bishop used Mark 8:22-26 as her text. This familiar story tells of the blind man in Bethsaida being led from the village into unfamiliar territory and cured by Jesus. Bishop Dyck compared this to the unfamiliar territory that the church is in now and how faith will restore and even strengthen church unity for the future.

The Wesley UMC men served a delicious breakfast and, of course, meeting other Methodist men from throughout northern Illinois is always an attraction.

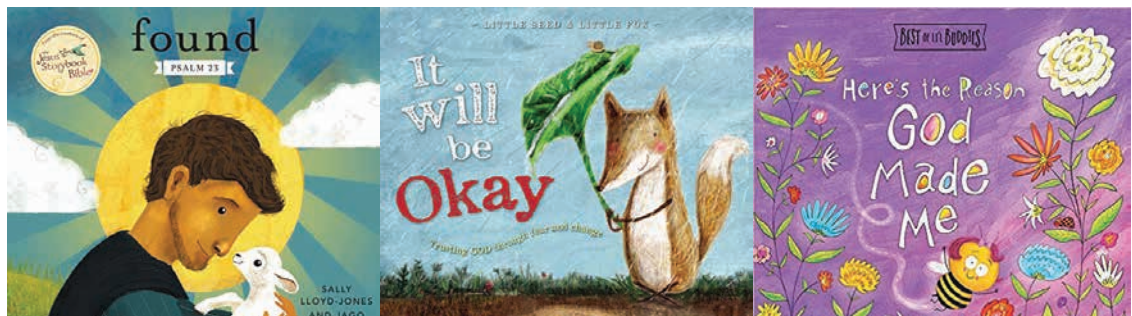

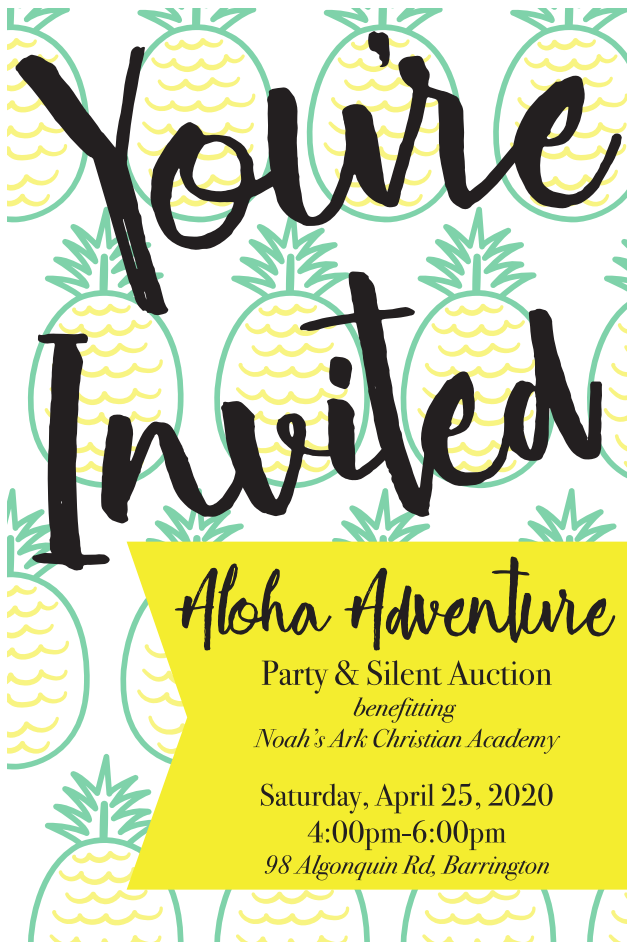
