

# This is my earliest memory of church...

**W**e stopped and my door opened quickly; the hinge of the early 70s Chevrolet groaned as it flipped to its widest position. My mother bent herself at an square angle, leaned down to unbuckle my seatbelt and grabbed my hand. We cut across the street with long strides. It was like I was floating; only the tips of my toes ever touched pavement. When we came to four stairs leading to a door, my father grabbed my other arm and, together, they lifted me to the top of them in choreographed motion.

As the doors opened, music escaped. We were late. We filed in and found a place to stand. Everyone was singing. Then they all sat down.

Mom handed me a red book and some strips of paper. She pointed to a wooden sign on the wall that had big, cream-colored numbers arranged in twos and threes. They were stacked one atop the other. She wanted me to find the numbers in the book. A bearded man talked for a long time. He was wearing what looked like a long scarf; I liked the pictures that were on it – the wheat and fish. We stood by the door for a while trying to leave. The people who sang wanted to talk to my parents. My baby brother started crying, so they let us go.

This is my earliest memory of church – a United Methodist Church we attended while living in Lafayette, Indiana. I'd go on to have many more memories in United Methodist churches.

My grandmother was the office administrator at one down the road in Crawfordsville, Indiana. I'd spend many a summer Friday exploring that building while she printed bulletins and answered phone calls. When we moved north to Illinois, it was the people of a United Methodist Church that became our family. My longest-standing friendships were with those people. Sunday School. The gift of a "Good News" Bible accompanied by a spoonful of honey. Chili fundraisers. A mission trip to Puerto Rico. My first kiss was even at a United Methodist Church.

Like so many others whom I've had the honor of pastoring, a great deal of my emotional experiences are marked by buildings, congregations, and ministries of the United Methodist Church. The UMC is the only church I've ever known. So, the upcoming special session of the UMC's General Conference in February is concerning to me. I'd like to know what the future holds for the

tradition I've come to love like family – or to even know what's likely to happen. But, because of the way our governance works, there is no way to know. The connection is not of one mind about human sexuality, and how that will all shake out is still a mystery.

There are some things I do know, however.

I know the distinctives that make methodism matter aren't trademarked like the cross and flame. The ways we do theology together, the ways we share and celebrate sacred things, and the simple principles from which our movement was born are too big to be divided by dispute. These distinctives are ingrained in our daily, congregational life. They make up our ethos. They aren't provocative, but they are worth celebrating.

So, in the weeks leading up to 2019 General Conference, we will spend time in worship and study highlighting them. Children, youth and adults are all invited to study the "Three Simple Rules" that every person in our tradition is tasked with following: Do Good, Do No Harm, Stay In Love With God. And, be sure to attend worship to give thanks to God for the unique ways United Methodists are called to bear witness to the gospel of Jesus Christ.

I don't know what will come for the UMC in February, there are some things I do know. I know Barrington UMC and First UMC of West Dundee will keep doing great ministry. We will keep making space for all people to be inspired in worship, grow in their faith with one another, and serve their neighbors to the Glory of God. We will keep gathering children and youth so they can build their faith and memories. We will take mission trips – one to Puerto Rico in June, even – to help rebuild the lives of our neighbors and remind them of God's unfailing love. And, we will keep assembling to sing and pray each Sunday and other days we claim as holy. Because, while change and uncertainty is abundant in our world, there will always be more reasons to be grateful than fearful. God hasn't stopped working, loving, forgiving. In the midst of all our trouble, God keeps arriving and renewing creation.

I don't know what will come for the UMC in February, but I do know God hasn't given up on us. You are in my prayers as we begin the new year, and I look forward to all the new memories we will make.

## Puerto Rico Hurricane Maria Recovery

The 2017 hurricane season caused Puerto Rico unprecedented levels of destruction, devastating the lives of millions of people and leaving hundreds of thousands homeless and displaced. The initial response has been slow for Puerto Rico as its food, fuel, and supplies are dependent on shipments from its air and sea ports, most of which have been severely damaged. The island's ports and airports are slowly reopening though, allowing much-needed aid to make its way into Puerto Rico.

One year after the devastating effects of Hurricane Maria, the United Methodist Committee on Relief and its partner, the Methodist Church of Puerto Rico, are

moving into Phase II of their response to this devastating event. Phase II can be described as moving from short-term recovery to long-term recovery. It will focus on rebuilding efforts on the island with teams of volunteers tackling rebuilding projects throughout the island. To date, there have been 35 teams encompassing 268 individuals from the mainland sent to Puerto Rico for the long-term recovery effort. There are plans to send 85 teams in 2019. Barrington United Methodist Church has been blessed to have been designated as a recovery team.



### **WIFM (What's in it for me?)**


### WOW *Women of the Word*






# The 19 Questions to Kindle a Wesleyan Spirit


## ALL-CHURCH STUDY




## Big Sing at McGonigal's Pub

## What an amazing first year and what an amazing mission!

In 2018, we have opened the Trinity building eight times to serve delicious meals to the community. One hundred five people follow us on Facebook to be reminded ahead of the third Saturday of each month. Ten families put out a yard sign every month to remind their neighbors.

Sixty-nine members of First UMC, Trinity UMC, Barrington UMC and Comunidad Cristiana participate regularly in preparing, serving and cleaning up after the meals. Some serve every month, and some when they can – but we’ve all become a powerful team. And, we’ve had help from Girl Scouts, Cub Scouts and Boy Scouts.

Attendance has built each month as people learn that the food is good and the fellowship is better. It is such a joy to see Fellowship Hall filled with friends and neighbors moving from table to table, talking and getting to know one another.

Any extra food at the end of the evening is delivered to PADS in Elgin where it is gratefully received and put to good use.

After reassessing, as promised, this mission will continue in 2019.

With a clearer look at the costs, we know that each meal costs us \$350 including food and paper goods. We’ve received support from local businesses throughout 2018 and look forward to further developing community support in 2019. 
## **Hungry communities worldwide thank you!**

*"We had a very wonderful rewarding time with over 100 students in several groups from age 4 to adult. Our theme this year was "Community," focusing on how we are all part of a community where we live and with God. We also worked on vocabulary that we use everyday, such as greetings, foods, clothing, animals, feelings, etc. We did crafts daily, decorating canvas bags, creating feeling faces and created cross necklaces and bracelets. Sandra took the helm for the teens, young adults and worked on sentence expansion as their English has improved over the last several years. One of the parents cooked for everyone every day and we were invited to the pastor's house for lunch. We were treated to music and dance at the graduation service on Sunday from a very grateful student and parent community."*



# Mujila Falls Agricultural Center

Barrington UMC has sponsored this important mission for over a decade through Rainbow Covenant giving. Mujila Falls is an agricultural school with a strong focus on providing proper and balanced nutritional choices. In addition to sponsoring the school, we have also sponsored Betty Tshala, nurse and nutritionist, as one of our missionaries and, previously, her husband, Tshala Mwengo, a graduate of Africa University and the Director of the Agricultural Center who was tragically killed in a bus accident in April of 2014. ## 2019 marks the 150th anniversary of United Methodist Women

Imagine being a woman with a child, arriving in a new country, not knowing the language, trying to navigate a complex immigration system and not knowing where to go next. This is what thousands of women faced in the late 1800s as they arrived in the new world, often alone to meet their husbands, fathers or other relatives who had traveled ahead.

The Women's Home Missionary Society of the Methodist Episcopal Church, the precursor of United Methodist Women, realized that these women traveling alone were not only in need of help, but also in danger, often robbed of everything they owned.

Helen and James Mathews and their daughter Alma, with the help of others, thus began a new ministry to help the vulnerable women arriving at the docks of New York. They rented a small house, and while two stayed home to run the household, two would comb the docks looking for single women disembarking the ships. They helped the women and their families through the immigration process, and offered a free and safe place to stay at what was then known as the Immigrant Girls' Home. The women then helped the newly arrived get to

their next destination, in New York or elsewhere in the country. In the year 1887 there were over 3,000 lodgers at the house, with 808 ships that were met by Methodist women.

When Helen and James had to leave the ministry, their daughter Alma took their place. Alma worked in this ministry for a whole generation – from the 1890s to 1922, and she later continued her work welcoming the immigrant as a greeter on Ellis Island. She died in 1933. The house was renamed the Alma Matthews House and was a vital part of United Methodist Women's ministry, until it was sold in 2016.





Here's to a new year where we continue forming deep relationship, sharing stories and learning about our God of new life!




