# When Will the Church Reopen?

A s state governors begin to make decisions to "reopen the economy" many have begun asking, "When will the Church reopen?" The fact of the matter is that we do not know and cannot predict when we will be able to meet again in person for worship, faith development and outreach. Given that the models for reopening all indicate that groups as small as ten might be allowed to meet first, with the size of groups gradually increasing, we are not likely to be allowed to worship together as a whole congregation for some months.

While there is so much we do not know, there are at least two things we can be confident of. The first is that the church will always seek to be, first and foremost, a place of healing and hope and new life. Therefore until we can be sure that our members, constituents, visitors and staff can be reasonably assured of their safety and well-being, we must resist the impulse to open too soon and put people at risk.

We will be looking to the Conference and the federal, state and local governments for guidance and to let us know what protocols we must follow when the time comes. We have been informed that in-person church related activities may well be one of the last pieces of social interaction to be fully reinstated. This can be attributed to several realities that the Church must recognize including: an aging population that has an elevated risk of infection; many of our churches do not have the physical space to allow for proper social distancing; and that the ability to properly prepare worship, meeting and administrative space between gatherings could present a challenge.

Indeed, theological reflection reminds us of the story of the wilderness journey of the Hebrew people in Exodus where they spent long days and nights in the wilderness in preparation for living into their new reality. Another intriguing story from which we might draw parallels is the story of Noah and the ark. After the flood that devastated the earth Noah had to patiently read the signs before determining that it was time to open the doors of the ark and begin writing a new story in covenant with the Creator God.

For now, please do everything you can to stay connected: participate in online worship, join a neighborhood group, support our missions and ministries, hold the church and one another in prayer and look for every opportunity to live your faith in your daily life. We will get through this difficult time as we continue to be the church God is calling us to be, even as we look forward to that day when we can be together again.

May God sustain you and give you peace.

#### **United Methodist Meetings Delayed Due to COVID 19 Pandemic**

If not for the COVID 19 outbreak that has brought such significant change to everyday life, the United Methodist General Conference would be meeting in Minneapolis this month. This key meeting was scheduled to consider legislation that almost certainly would significantly alter the makeup of the UMC. Plans for division, separation and dissolving the church were all submitted and would have been considered by the delegates who are elected from around the world.

General Conference has been postponed until 2021 and a tentative date was released but has not been confirmed. The delay is unprecedented in the 200+ year history of the church. It is anticipated that the Conference will be held in Minneapolis next fall.

You may use ordinary white bread or—as in other places in the world—a tortilla or rice cake or something similar. What is important is that this element be a representation of the most common food of life. If you wish to expand your worship experience you might prepare something homemade or unique to your family tradition or origin. For the cup, prepare a cup of juice or wine—whatever fruit of the vine you are comfortable with.

Set these elements in the space where you worship electronically with our faith community. Perhaps you want to put them on a lovely cloth or fabric that reminds you of a special time or a person deeply connected with you in the communion of saints. Perhaps you will light a candle or place a flower or plant or the photograph of someone you wish to bring into the circle of faith beside the bread and the cup.

# MASK SHORTAGES by Sydney Whitley

A ational shortages of masks have forced hospitals and other essential services to turn to a patchwork of local providers to provide protection for essential workers in the pandemic crisis. To answer the call, the First and BUMC "Face Mask Factory" has produced and donated over 1100 masks to help protect our community from the COVID-19 virus! Forty-five volunteers in our cottage industry have donated fabric, cut, and distributed mask-making kits to our network of sewers. The completed masks have been delivered to Northwest Community Healthcare (NCH) and other local hospitals, as well as congregation members, family and friends in our local community and across the country.

When I started sewing masks, I wasn't intending to start an entire distribution system. I started sewing on my own after a friend in Indianapolis said that her group was making masks for a hospital in Evansville, Indiana. I used YouTube as my guide on the specifications and the most efficient methods.

Then on March 26, the University of Chicago implemented universal masking requirements and requested donations of home-made masks to supplement their supply of professional grade masks. Peggy Eastwood sent me and other seamstresses a link to the UC site, offering to deliver any masks we made for UC.



#### So we set out to start making masks.

By April 2, Northwest Community Healthcare expected to run out of masks and would now need them for all hospital workers. On April 3, offering fabric left over from the Rummage Sale, Linda Osikowicz put out the call to action to the UMW for sewers to get going. That afternoon, on a masked and socially distanced walk with Silvia Grabacki, we recruited the Bradford family teens right from their front yard. They offered to cut out fabric and elastic to make the first complete "kits". Silvia and Tim also joined the effort, and Tim's Scout skills were put to use in coiling elastic 'just so'.

After announcing the need for workers in the April 4 pre-Palm Sunday email to the congregation, offers to help begin pouring in from the BUMC and the First UMC of West Dundee congregations, and several congregation members recruited friends. Within four days, the first delivery of 197 masks was dropped off, and deliveries have been made twice a week since then.

#### Supplies

We have been fortunate to have a large donation or fabric that belonged to the late Barb West, an artist and crafter whose legacy is found in several art creations in the building. Folks have dug into their sewing baskets and found leftover fabric from previous projects, or cut up men's cotton dress shirts or sheets. Lisa Bubolz found a bolt of Christmas fabric; Sharon Schule found 40 yards of muslin, which has been used as the back side of many of the masks. My daughter Allison ordered over 1000 yards of elastic, which has been in short supply due to the nationwide mobilization of mask-makers.

#### Where else are our donations going?

In addition to NCH, masks have been sent to many other facilities, including Advocate Good Shepherd, Sherman Hospital in Elgin, the Lake Zurich Library, and to individual clinicians or scientists at the University of Alabama Birmingham, the National Institutes of Health in Bethesda, MD, and New York Presbyterian Westchester Behavioral Health Center. New requests from House of Hope and Project Hope in Barrington and ChildServe in Elgin have come in recently as well.

Closer to home, we plan to make child-sized masks for the children of our Sunday Schools and the teens in the youth group. The BUMC kits of fabric and elastic are also helping to fulfill many individual requests from family and friends, which have been sent all over the country.

#### Volunteers

Approximately 45 volunteers from our congregations have contributed. At least one husband is an expert pleat ironer (who knew?). Don Dugger drops off supplies and picks up many completed masks produced by his friends the Szydlowskis. A young mother, the daughter of a congregant of First UMC of West Dundee, has managed to sew many masks while managing two preschoolers. Many have commented on the satisfaction it gives to participate.

Martha, one of Sam Oliver's friends who donated fabric, said "I wasn't one of the busy sewers, but my fabric donations gave me a happy feeling of contribution to the community in its time of special need. I like the thought that the community is pulling together for the health of all."



Sue Dyon added, "Although I had not used my sewing machine in over 15 years, I volunteered for this project because I wanted to help and give something back. It takes me nearly 20 minutes to complete one mask, but I get a special feeling with each one I finish. Some days I make only 3 or 4 and other days it might be 12 or 15. I try and make at least 1 every day."

Linda Osikowicz shared, "I do try to say a prayer for the recipients' safety as I am sewing the masks. And, my mind goes back to ladies in the past who made bandages during previous wars and how people came together during WWII to deal with shortages of many things. We are part of a new and different war effort by pitching in to protect the people in our community."

#### How you can help

Our neighbors will continue to need masks into the summer. In one hour, you can cut kits for about 50 masks, or sew about 6 masks. If you would like to volunteer to cut fabric or sew masks, contact Sydney Whitley at sparkerwhitley@gmail.com





# THE OTTAWA-BARRINGTON GROWING PROJECT

#### **Growing Hope Globally**

Since our growing project began in 2004, Barrington UMC, Trinity Lutheran in Ottawa and our farmer partners have donated almost \$590, 000 to programs that develop sustainable agriculture in the DRC, in Malawi and, more recently, in Nicaragua. Growing Hope Globally (formerly Foods Resource Bank) carefully vets and monitors the programs they support. All overseas programs are led by Christian organizations and all focus on supplying the agricultural training and resources to bring entire communities from starvation to success. Measured results show that \$55 donated through Growing Hope brings one person out of starvation for life. Last year, despite a truly difficult growing season, our project donated \$29,460 – enough to help 536 people!

Last year we supported two different programs in Nicaragua – Carazo Diriamba and Conquista Nandiame. **Carazo Diriambe** is a long established program of Church World Service in partnership with UMCOR. Diriambe is the third group of communities they



have worked with to help overcome the difficulties of climate change, environmental degradation and drought. The program teaches conservation agriculture, encourages planting fruit trees and patio gardens and helps develop access to clean water. **Conquista Nandiame**, in the Pacific Dry Corridor, is led by World Renew, the mission arm of the Christian Reformed Church. Increasing temperatures and drought have dried up wells and

required emergency food aid in this area. The program teaches dry farming techniques, has introduced alternative crops, and supports the development of clean drinking water systems.

These are life changing interventions that keep families together in their homes and allow them to plan for their futures. Your support makes this happen.

**How?** Barrington UMC and Trinity Lutheran Church in Ottawa donate funds to pay for seeds, fertilizer and fuel for a certain number of acres of this year's crop. Our farmer partners donate use of their land, labor and equipment. When the crop is sold, the value of the production of those acres is given to Growing Hope Globally.



Somehow, no matter how difficult the year, our harvest has been blessed and always increased our donations — something we celebrate together at the annual Harvest Festival.

Inputs for an acre of corn are \$830, a half-acre is \$415, and a quarter-acre \$208. Your donation in any amount makes a difference. #### **Congregational Garden**

# There will be a Congregational Garden this year and there will be plenty of opportunities for YOU to volunteer (at a healthy distance from one another).

The seedlings are already started at Horchers Country Flowers in Wheeling. Lou Schairer checks on their progress regularly. Bill West waited impatiently for our fields to dry out and has finally been able to start plowing so that he can turn in some fertilizer to amend the soil in accordance with the test results we've received. Once tilling is complete, a small team is ready set out the irrigation, and by June there will be plenty of opportunity for you to help set out the seedlings; plant hills of squash, cucumbers and pumpkins; set out tomato cages; and weed, weed.

Last year, the Congregational Garden produced 34,167 pounds of produce that was shared across seven food pantries in Kane, McHenry, Lake and Cook Counties. Every year, we know that we have hungry neighbors that need nutritious fresh produce. This year, we know that there is already 40% more need and that, until the food supply chain catches up, grocery stores won't have as much excess to give to the food pantries. The garden is a great way for you to help out AND a great opportunity to safely get out of your house and work alongside friends. Plan to join us!

#### **Reach Guatemala update**

United Methodist Women national and international missions are working hard to maintain and increase their services as the need becomes greater. Sometimes it is so interesting to see how God has been at work! In 2019, the women's work coordinator

of the North Katanga Annual Conference in Central Africa applied for an Economic Development Grant from United Methodist Women. The \$14,000 grant the Conference received was earmarked to train women in soap-making in 24 Districts of North Katanga Annual Conference in the Democratic Republic of Congo.

"Under the leadership of Honorine Mujing Mwaad and her team, one step at a time the women of North Katanga Annual Conference were transforming their lives through the soap-making grant from United Methodist Women," noted Grace Musuka.



Little did the North Katanga Annual Conference in DRC know how valuable its soapmaking enterprise would turn out to be. In response to COVID-19, the women, through their phone networks, are sharing the message about staying at home, washing hands with soap and praying. They are using the soap in their homes and distributing it to widows and orphans as well as selling some. The women and young adults trained in soap-making are going a step further to train other women in this skill.
